

INTRODUCTION

The **icos system HE range** is a cast aluminium wall mounted, full sequence, automatic spark ignition, low water content, fanned flue, high efficiency, condensing system gas boiler.

Note. Due to the high efficiency of the boiler a plume of water vapour will form at the terminal during operation.

The output is fully modulating with a range of:

8.8 to 23.4 kW (30,000 to 80,000 Btu/h)

The boiler is supplied fully assembled with circulating pump, pressure gauge, safety valve and expansion vessel.

Variable temperature control is fitted on the user control.

The boiler casing is of white painted coated mild steel with the user controls capable of being mounted remotely from the boiler if the option is required.

The heat exchanger is of cast aluminium.

The boiler is suitable for connection to fully pumped, sealed water systems ONLY.

Adequate arrangements for completely draining the system by provision of drain cocks MUST be provided in the installation pipework.

Pipework from the boiler is routed downwards as standard, but may be routed upwards behind the boiler using the stand-off frame (supplied in a separate kit).

OPERATION

When there is a demand for heat, the heating system is supplied at the selected temperature of between 30°C and 82°C.

Refer also to Frame 1 - 'Boiler Water Circuit Diagram'

The boiler features a comprehensive diagnostic system which gives detailed information on the boiler status when operating, and performance of key components to aid commissioning and fault finding.

SAFE HANDLING

This boiler may require 2 or more operatives to move it to its installation site, remove it from its packaging base and during movement into its installation location. Manoeuvring the boiler may include the use of a sack truck and involve lifting, pushing and pulling.


Caution should be exercised during these operations.

Operatives should be knowledgeable in handling techniques when performing these tasks and the following precautions should be considered:

- Grip the boiler at the base.
- · Be physically capable.
- Use PPE as appropriate, e.g. gloves, safety footwear.

During all manoeuvres and handling actions, every attempt should be made to ensure the following unless unavoidable and/or the weight is light.

- · Keep back straight.
- · Avoid twisting at the waist.
- Avoid upper body/top heavy bending.
- Always grip with the palm of the hand.
- Use designated hand holds.
- · Keep load as close to the body as possible.
- · Always use assistance if required.



OPTIONAL EXTRA KITS

- Flue Extension Ducts (1000mm long, up to 6m).
- Flue Finishing Kit.
- 90° Elbow Kit (Maximum 4 elbows / installation).
- 45° Elbow Kit (Maximum 4 elbows / installation).
- Powered Vertical Flue Kit (to a maximum primary flue length of 8m + a maximum secondary flue length of 6m).
- Roof Flue Kit (to a maximum of 8m).
- Twin flueing Kit (to a maximum of 46m combined total of flue and air ducts).
- Remote User Controls Kit.

- Siphon Kit.
- Valve Cover Kit.

SAFETY

Current Gas Safety (Installation & Use) Regulations or rules in force.

The appliance is suitable only for installation in GB and IE and should be installed in accordance with the rules in force.

In GB, the installation must be carried out by a CORGI Registered Installer. It must be carried out in accordance with the relevant requirements of the:

- · Gas Safety (Installation and Use) Regulations
- The appropriate Building Regulations either The Building Regulations, The Building Regulations (Scotland), Building Regulations (northern Ireland).
- The Water Fittings Regulations or Water byelaws in Scotland.
- The Current I.E.E. Wiring Regulations.

Where no specific instructions are given, reference should be made to the relevant British Standard Code of Practice.

In IE, the installation must be carried out by a Competent Person and installed in accordance with the current edition of I.S.813 "Domestic Gas Installations", the current Building Regulations and reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installation.

Detailed recommendations are contained in the following British Standard Codes of Practice:

Health & Safety Document No. 635.

The Electricity at Work Regulations, 1989.

The manufacturer's notes must NOT be taken, in any way, as overriding statutory obligations.

IMPORTANT. These appliances are CE certificated for safety and performance. It is, therefore, important that no external control devices, e.g. flue dampers, economisers etc., are directly connected to these appliances unless covered by these Installation and Servicing Instructions or as otherwise recommended by **Caradon Ideal Limited** in writing. If in doubt please enquire.

Any direct connection of a control device not approved by **Caradon Ideal Limited** could invalidate the certification and the normal appliance warranty. It could also infringe the Gas Safety Regulations and the above regulations.

SAFE HANDLING OF SUBSTANCES

Care should be taken when handling the boiler insulation panels, which can cause irritation to the skin. No asbestos, mercury or CFCs are included in any part of the boiler or its manufacture.

LOCATION OF BOILER

The boiler must be installed on a flat and vertical wall, capable of adequately supporting the weight of the boiler and any ancillary equipment.

The boiler may be fitted on a combustible wall and insulation between the wall and the boiler is not necessary, unless required by the local authority.

For electrical safety reasons there must be no access available from the back of the boiler.

The boiler must not be fitted outside.

Timber Framed Buildings

If the boiler is to be fitted in a timber framed building it should be fitted in accordance with the Institute of Gas Engineering document IGE/UP/7:1998.

Bathroom Installations

This appliance is rated IP20.

The boiler may be installed in any room or internal space, although particular attention is drawn to the requirements of the current IEE (BS.7671) Wiring Regulations and, in Scotland, the electrical provisions of the building regulations applicable in Scotland, with respect to the installation of the boiler in a room or internal space containing a bath or shower. For Ireland reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installations and I.S.813:2002.

If the appliance is to be installed in a room containing a bath or shower then, providing water jets are not going to be used for cleaning purposes (as in communal baths/showers), the appliance can be installed in Zone 3, as detailed in BS.7671.

Compartment Installations

A compartment used to enclose the boiler should be designed and constructed specially for this purpose.

An existing cupboard or compartment may be used, provided that it is modified for the purpose.

In both cases, details of essential features of cupboard / compartment design, including airing cupboard installation, are to conform to the following:

- BS. 6798 (No cupboard ventilation is required see 'Air Supply' for details).
- The position selected for installation MUST allow adequate space for servicing in front of the boiler.
- For the minimum clearances required for safety and subsequent service, see the wall mounting template and Frame 2. In addition, sufficient space may be required to allow lifting access to the wall mounting plate.

2 BOILER DIMENSIONS, SERVICES & CLEARANCES

The boiler connections are made on the boiler piping frame. Refer to Frames 27 & 29.

The following minimum clearances must be maintained for operation and servicing.

Additional space will be required for installation, depending upon site conditions.

Side and Rear Flue


a. Provided that the flue hole is cut accurately, e.g. with a core drill, the flue can be installed from inside the building

where wall thicknesses do not exceed 600mm (24"). Where the space into which the boiler is going to be installed is less than the length of flue required the flue must be fitted from the outside.



Installation from inside ONLY

b. If a core boring tool is to be used inside the building the space in which the boiler is to be installed must be at least wide enough to accommodate the tool.



CLEARANCES



Front clearance

The minimum front clearance when built in to a cupboard is 5 mm (1/4") from the cupboard door but $450 \text{mm} (17 \ 3/4")$ overall clearance is still required, with the cupboard door open, to allow for servicing.

N.B. The boiler will not fit into a standard depth wall unit. In order for it to do so the plastic fascia should be removed. See Frame 38.

* Bottom clearance

After installation can be reduced to 5mm in an adequately ventilated enclosed cupboard. However, 100mm must be available for servicing.

GAS SUPPLY

The local gas supplier should be consulted, at the installation planning stage, in order to establish the availability of an adequate supply of gas. An existing service pipe must NOT be used without prior consultation with the local gas supplier. The boiler MUST be installed on a gas supply with a governed meter only.

A gas meter can only be connected by the local gas supplier or by a CORGI registered engineer. In IE by a Competent Person. An existing meter should be checked, preferably by the gas supplier, to ensure that the meter is adequate to deal with the rate of gas supply required.

N.B. The principle of the 1:1 gas valve ensures that the icos system HE range is able to deliver it's full output at inlet pressures down to 14mb. However if dynamic pressures below 20mb are experienced ensure this is adequate for ALL other gas appliances in the property.

IMPORTANT.

Installation pipes MUST be fitted in accordance with BS.6891. In IE refer to I.S.813:2002. Pipework from the meter to the boiler MUST be of an adequate size, i.e. no longer than 20m and not less than 15mm O.D.

The complete installation MUST be tested for gas soundness and purged as described in the above code.

FLUE INSTALLATION

Pluming will occur at the terminal, so where possible, terminal positions where this could cause a nuisance should be avoided.

The flue must be installed in accordance with the recommendations of BS.5440-1:2000. In IE refer to I.S.813:2002.

The following notes are intended for general guidance:

- The boiler MUST be installed so that the terminal is exposed to external air.
- 2. It is important that the position of the terminal allows the free passage of air across it at all times.

- Minimum acceptable spacing from the terminal to obstructions and ventilation openings are specified in Table 3.
- **4.** Where the lowest part of the terminal is fitted less than 2m (6'6") above a balcony, above ground or above a flat roof to which people have access then the terminal MUST be protected by a purpose designed guard.

Terminal guards are available from boiler suppliers. (ask for TFC flue guard model no. K6 - round, plastic coated). In case of difficulty contact:

Ensure that the guard is fitted centrally.

- 5. The flue assembly shall be so placed or shielded as to prevent ignition or damage to any art of any building.
- 6. The air inlet/products outlet duct and the terminal of the boiler MUST NOT be closer than 25mm (1") to combustible material. Detailed recommendations on the protection of combustible material are given in BS.5440-1:2000. In IE refer to I.S.813:2002.

IMPORTANT. It is absolutely essential to ensure, in practice, that products of combustion discharging from the terminal cannot re-enter the building or any other adjacent building through ventilators, windows, doors, other sources of natural air infiltration, or forced ventilation / air conditioning.

If this should occur the appliance MUST be turned OFF, labelled as 'unsafe' until corrective action can be taken.

TERMINAL

The terminal assembly can be adapted to accommodate various wall thicknesses. Refer to Frame 12.

AIR SUPPLY

It is NOT necessary to have a purpose-provided air vent in the room or internal space in which the boiler is installed. Neither is it necessary to ventilate a cupboard or compartment in which the boiler is installed, due to the low surface temperatures of the boiler casing during operation; therefore the requirements of BS.6798, Clause 12, and BS 5440:2 may be disregarded. In IE the requirements of I.S.813:2002 may be disregarded.

WATER CIRCULATION SYSTEM

IMPORTANT.

A minimum length of 1metre of copper pipe MUST be fitted to both flow and return connections from the boiler before connection to any plastic piping.

The central heating system should be in accordance with BS.6798 and, in addition, for smallbore and microbore systems, BS.5449.

The hot water storage cylinder MUST be of the indirect type and should preferably be made of copper.

Single feed, indirect cylinders MUST NOT be used. The appliances are NOT suitable for gravity central heating nor are they suitable for the provision of gravity domestic hot water.


The hot water cylinder and ancillary pipework, not forming part of the useful heating surface, should be lagged to prevent heat loss and any possible freezing - particularly where pipes run through roof spaces and ventilated underfloor spaces.

WATER TREATMENT - see Frame 6

The hydraulic resistance of the boilers, at MAXIMUM OUTPUT, with an 11°C (20°F) temperature differential, is shown in Graph 1.

BOILER CONTROL INTERLOCKS

Caradon Ideal Limited recommend that heating systems utilising full thermostatic radiator valve control of temperature in individual rooms should also be fitted with a room thermostat controlling the temperature in a space served by radiators not fitted with such a valve as stated in BS. 5449.

When thermostatic radiator valves are used, the space heating temperature control over a living area having a heating requirement of at least 0.9kW (3000Btu/h) of the boiler heat output should be achieved using a room thermostat whilst other rooms are individually controlled by thermostatic radiator valves. A higher proportion of TRVs may be used, provided that

a bypass between the boiler flow and return is fitted, to ensure adequate flow when all TRVs are closed.

ELECTRICAL SUPPLY

WARNING. The appliance MUST be efficiently earthed.

Wiring external to the appliance MUST be in accordance with the current I.E.E. (BS.7671) Wiring Regulations and any local regualtions which apply. For Ireland reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installations.

The point of connection to the mains should be readily accessible and adjacent to the boiler.

CONDENSATE DRAIN - Refer to Frames 22, 23 & 24

A condensate drain is provided on the boiler. This drain must be connected to a drainage point on site. All pipework and fittings in the condensate drainage system MUST be made of plastic - no other materials may be used.

IMPORTANT.

Any external runs must be insulated

The drain outlet on the boiler is standard 21.5mm (3/4") overflow pipe.

3 SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

Notes

- a. The method of filling, refilling, topping up or flushing sealed primary hot water circuits from the mains via a temporary hose connection is only allowed if acceptable to the local water authority.
- b. Antifreeze fluid, corrosion and scale inhibitor fluids suitable for use with boilers having aluminium heat exchangers may be used in the central heating system.

Advice should be sought from a local water treatment company.

4 SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS - continued

General

- The installation must comply with all relevant national and local regulations.
- The installation should be designed to work with flow temperatures of up to 82 °C.
- All components of the system must be suitable for a working pressure of 3 bar and temperature of 110 °C. Extra care should be taken in making all connections so that the risk of leakage is minimised.

The following components are incorporated within the appliance:

- a. Circulating pump.
- Safety valve, with a non-adjustable preset lift pressure of 3 bar
- c. Pressure gauge, covering a range of 0 to 6 bar.
- d. An 8-litre expansion vessel, with an initial charge pressure of 0.75 bar.
- 4. 'Make-up' Water. Provision must be made for replacing water loss from the system, either:
 - a. From a manually filled 'make-up' vessel with a readily visible water level. The vessel should be mounted at least 150mm above the highest point of the system and be connected through a non-return valve to the system, fitted at least 150mm below the 'make-up' vessel on the return side of the radiators.

or

 Where access to a 'make-up' vessel would be difficult, by pre-pressurisation of the system. The maximum cold water capacity of the system should not exceed 143 litres, if not pressurized. However, if the system is to be pressurized, the efficiency of the expansion vessel will be reduced and a larger vessel (or smaller system volume) may be necessary. If the capacity of the vessel is not considered sufficient for this, or for any other reason, an additional vessel MUST be installed on the return to the boiler.

Guidance on vessel sizing is given in Frame 3.


5. Filling. The system may be filled by the following method:

Through a temporary hose connection from a 'draw-off' tap, supplied from a service pipe under mains pressure. Where the mains pressure is excessive, a pressure reducing valve must be used to facilitate filling.

When installing the filling device, it must be connected as below to fully comply with the water regulations.

This may involve the fitting of an additional WRAS approved isolator valve to the mains supply.

- Thoroughly flush out the whole system with cold water.
- ii. Fill and vent the system until the pressure gauge registers 1.5 bar, and examine for leaks.
- iii. Check the operation of the safety valve by raising the water pressure until the valve lifts. This should occur within 0.3 bar of the preset lift pressure.
- iv. Release water from the system until the minimum system design pressure is reached; 1.0 bar if the system is to be pre-pressurised.



5 SYSTEM BALANCING

The boiler does not normally need a bypass but at least some radiators on the heating circuit, of load at least 10% of the minimum boiler output, must be provided with twin lockshield valves so that this minimum heating load is always available. See note regarding thermostatic radiator valves on page 10.

Note.

Systems incorporating zone valves which could completely cut off the flow through the system, must also include a bypass.

BALANCING

1. Set the programmer to ON, for both CH and DHW. Turn the cylinder thermostat down.

Close the manual or thermostatic valves on all radiators, leaving the twin lockshield valves (on the radiators referred to above) in the OPEN position.

Turn up the room thermostat and adjust these lockshield valves to give boiler flow and return temperatures not more than 20 $^{\circ}\text{C}$ apart.

These valves should now be left as set.

- Open all manual or thermostatic radiator valves and adjust the lockshield valves on the remaining radiators, to give around 15 °C temperature drop at each radiator.
- 3. Turn up the cylinder thermostat and adjust the cylinder balancing valve so that the cylinder achieves a maximum flow consistent with adequate flow to the radiators. Check that with only the domestic hot water loop in circuit a differential temperature of 20 °C across the boiler is not exceeded.
- Adjust the room and cylinder thermostat and programmer to NORMAL settings.

6 WATER TREATMENT

The icos system HE range has an ALUMINIUM alloy heat exchanger.

IMPORTANT. The application of any other treatment to this product may render the guarantee of **Caradon Ideal Limited INVALID**.

Caradon Ideal Limited recommend Water Treatment in accordance with the *Benchmark* Guidance Notes on Water Treatment in Central Heating Systems.

Caradon Ideal Limited recommend the use of Fernox Copal or MB1, GE Betz Sentinel X100 or Salamander Corrosion Guard inhibitors and associated water treatment products, which must be used in accordance with the manufacturers instructions.

22 CONDENSATE DRAIN

Refer also to the British Gas document: 'Guidance Notes for the Installation of Domestic Gas Condensing Boilers' (1989).



Before mounting the boiler on the wall, the condensate drain (provided in the h/ware pack) must be connected from the boiler 'S' trap to a drainage point, preferably within the building.

Ensure that the condensate trap is full of water before commissioning the boiler. Refer to Frame 25.

The routing of the drain must be made to allow a minimum fall of 1 in 20 away from the boiler, throughout its length.


The drainage pipework must be arranged so that obstruction (e.g. through freezing) of external drainage pipe does not give rise to spillage within the dwelling.

IMPORTANT.

If excessive external pipework cannot be avoided, an additional siphon kit and insulation are recommended, in order to prevent possible freezing.

All pipework and fittings in the condensate drain system must be made of plastic. No other materials may be used.




25 MOUNTING THE BOILER


IMPORTANT.

- Before mounting the boiler on the wall place it on its left hand side, fit the 'S' trap hose moulding/nut and fold the hose to facilitate fitting into pre-piping frame
- Ensure that the plastic plugs are removed from both the CH and DHW pipes before mounting.
 N.B. Some spillage of water may occur from the pipework when mounting the boiler to the frame.
- 3. Lift the boiler onto the wall mounting frame, locating it over the tabs at the top of the frame.
- **4.** Lower the boiler into position, engaging it onto the support bracket.

Note. Ensure the condensate drain pipe is correctly positioned through the hole in the prepiping frame before continuing.

- Using the fibre washers supplied in the hardware pack box, engage and then tighten the 2 water unions.
- **6.** Engage and tighten the gas union, ensuring that the green fibre washer is in place. DO NOT overtighten.
- Connect a pipe to the safety drain outlet using the nut and olive supplied in the boiler hardware pack box.






26 CONNECTING THE FLUE TO THE BOILER

Note. Before fitting the flue turret fill the condensate trap within the boiler by pouring a cupful of water into the flue outlet A. Take care to ensure that the water is only poured into the flue outlet, and does not spill into the boiler casing.

- 1. Locate the flue into the turret.
- Insert the flue assembly through the prepared hole in the wall
- Locate the flue turret on the top of the boiler, ensuring that the turret gasket is in place. Check that the flue 'A' seal located in the top of the flue manifold is secure and giving an effective seal.
- 4. Secure the flue turret on top of the boiler by inserting the open ends of the turret clamp under the 2 studs and fixing it in the middle with the single M5 x 10mm pozihex screw provided.
- 5. Flues over 1 metre long.

Fix the flue support bracket to the wall, using the wall plugs and wood screws.

NB. The support bracket will utilise one fixing hole only whilst used in conjunction with the stand-off option.



27 GAS CONNECTION

IMPORTANT. The gas service cock is sealed with a non-metallic green fibre washer so must not be overheated when making capillary connections.


Refer to Frame 2 for details of the position of the gas connection.

N.B. The principle of the 1:1 gas valve ensures that the **icos system HE range** is able to deliver it's full output at inlet pressures down to 14mb. However if dynamic pressures below 20mb are experienced ensure this is adequate for **ALL** other gas appliances in the property.

A boiler gas supply pipe length of 20m and not less than 15mm O.D. can be connected to the boiler via the gas service cock union.

Ensure that the gas supply pipe does not foul the boiler casing.

Refer to Frame 37 or 'Servicing' for details of the pressure test point position.



28 SAFETY VALVE DRAIN


The safety valve is located at the bottom RHS of the boiler.

The discharge pipe should be positioned so that the discharge of water or steam cannot create a hazard to the occupants of the premises or damage the electrical components and wiring.

29 WATER CONNECTIONS

Notes.

- 1. For heating loads in excess of 60,000 Btu/h use 28mm x 22mm connectors to connect the boiler flow and return pipes to 28mm system pipework.
- **2.** Do not subject any of the isolating valves to heat as the seals may be damaged.




30 FILLING

- **1.** Remove the boiler front and sealing panels. Refer to Frames 42 & 43.
- 2. Swing the control box down into the servicing position Refer to Frame 44.
- 3. Ensure that the isolating valves are open.
- 4. Fill and vent the system. Check for water soundness.

IMPORTANT - when filling:

- **a.** When filling, there may be a slight water leak from the vent therefore electrical connections should be protected.
- **b.** Bleed any air from the pump and ensure that it is free to rotate.
 - i. Remove the vent plug
 - ii. Using a screwdriver, rotate the shaft several times
 - iii. Replace the vent plug.

Note. Some slight water leakage will occur.



31 ELECTRICAL CONNECTIONS

WARNING. This appliance MUST be earthed.

A mains supply of 230 V ~ 50 Hz is required.

The fuse rating should be 3A.

All external controls and wiring must be suitable for mains voltage.

Wiring external to the boiler MUST be in accordance with the current I.E.E. (BS.7671) Wiring Regulations and any local regulations.

Wiring should be 3 core PVC insulated cable, not less than 0.75 mm² (24 x 0.2mm), and to BS 6500 Table 16. For IE reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installations.

Connection must be made in a way that allows complete isolation of the electrical supply such as a double pole switch having a 3mm (1/8") contact separation in both poles, or a plug and socket, serving only the boiler and system controls. The means of isolation must be accessible to the user after installation.

32 INTERNAL WIRING

A pictorial wiring diagram is shown in Frame 34.


- Route the mains cable into the bottom rear centre of the boiler.
- Wire the permanent live supply into the 5-way remote plug terminals, L3, N & ±.


IMPORTANT. The permanent live is ESSENTIAL in order for the advanced diagnostic controls to function correctly.

- Wire the switched live supply into terminal L2 or connect L1 and L2 via external control switching, as shown in Frame 33. In either case, remove the wire link fitted to L1 and L2.
- 4. Secure the mains lead with the cable clamp.
- Connect the mains lead connector. Ensure it is fully located.

Ensure that the lengths of the current carrying conductors are shorter than the earth conductor so that if the cable slips in its anchorage the current carrying conductors become taut before the earth conductor.

33 EXTERNAL ELECTRICAL CONTROLS

Wiring external to the boiler MUST be in accordance with the current I.E.E. (BS.7671) Wiring Regulations and any local regulations. For IE reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installations.

The fuse rating should be 3A.

Room Thermostat

If the thermostat has a neutral connection, use it (it provides for more energy efficient operation by reducing switching temperature differentials).

Frost Protection

If parts of the pipework run outside the house or if the boiler will be left off for more than a day or so then a frost thermostat should be wired into the system. This is usually done at the programmer, in which case the programmer selector switches are set to OFF and all the other controls MUST be left in the running position.

The frost thermostat should be sited in a cold place but where it can sense heat from the system.

If the boiler is installed in a garage it may be necessary to fit a pipe thermostat, preferably on the return pipework.

Designation of the terminals will vary but the programmer and thermostat manufacturers' leaflets will give full details.



2. ALWAYS carry out the preliminary electrical system checks, i.e. earth continuity, polarity, resistance to earth and short circuit, using a suitable test meter.

B. Gas Installation

- The whole of the gas installation, including the meter, should be inspected and tested for soundness and purged in accordance with the recommendations of BS. 6891. In IE refer to I.S.813:2002.
- 2. Purge air from the gas installation by the approved methods only.

WARNING. Whilst effecting the required gas soundness test and purging air from the gas installation, open all windows and doors, extinguish naked lights and DO NOT SMOKE.

1. Check that the system has been filled and that the boiler is not airlocked. Ensure the automatic air vent cap (N) is open.

It is important the burner is not operated before the system is fully vented of air. If it is necessary to operate the appliance pump to assist venting of the air this must be done with the gas service cock turned off.

- 2. Refit the boiler sealing panel. Refer to Frame 43.
- 3. Check that all the drain cocks are closed and that the isolating valves (T and S) are OPEN.
- 4. Check that the electrical supply is OFF.
- 5. Check that the boiler on/off switch (A) is off.
- 6. Check that the gas service cock (H) is OPEN.
- 7. Carefully align the user control and push gently into place. Secure with the single screw located underneath.
- 8. Slacken the screw in the inlet pressure test point (G) and connect a gas pressure gauge via a flexible tube.
- 9. Swing the control panel to the working position and secure with the clamp.

- 10. Connect the low voltage electrical lead from the user control to the control box (refer to Frame 44).
- 11. Screw the control into position.
- 12. Switch the electricity supply ON and check all external controls are calling for heat.

The display

The user control has one neon and one display to inform the user about the status. The display will show the status of the boiler. The neon will show the status of the flame. If no flame is detected the neon is blinking. When the flame is detected the neon will be lit permanently.

Below is a list with the display function in normal operation.


- Standby, no demand for heat present.
- Boiler is active for central heating.

- 13. Set the boiler thermostat knob (B) to position 6 and switch the boiler on/off switch (A) to ON. The boiler control should now go through its ignition sequence until the burner is established.
- 14. If the boiler does not light after 3 attempts, fault code \(\textit{L}\) \(\textit{F}\) will be displayed. Press the reset button (E) and the boiler will repeat its ignition sequence.

When the burner is established the WHITE 'Burner On' neon (D) will be illuminated and the LED display will show status ϵ .

15. Ensure that with the boiler operating the dynamic gas pressure is able to obtain maximum output. Refer to Table 2.

- **18.** Remove the pressure gauge and tube. Tighten the sealing screw in the pressure test point. Ensure a gas tight seal is made.

22. THE FASCIA

- **b.** Fill the remaining fixing holes with the white push in caps provided.
- 23. Switch the boiler on again.

39 GENERAL CHECKS

Make the following checks for correct operation:

- Ensure that the external controls are calling for heat. After ignition the display should read:
 - c 🔆 white neon on.

2. Gas Rate

Check the boiler gas rate when the boiler is at full output checked at the gas meter, with no other appliance in use.

Refer to Table 2 for gas rates.

Set the external controls to OFF. The burner should go off and the pump continue to run for a few seconds.

The display should read:

c returning to

g when the pump stops.

Check the correct operation of the programmer (if fitted) and all other system controls. Operate each control separately and check that the main burner responds.

Water circulation system

- With the system COLD, check that the initial pressure is correct to the system design requirements. For pre-pressurised systems, this should be 1.0 bar.
- **6.** With the system HOT, examine all water connections for soundness. The system pressure will increase with temperature rise but should not exceed 2.5 bar.
- 7. With the system still hot, turn off the gas, water and electricity supplies to the boiler and drain down to complete the flushing process.

- Note. A flushing solution should be used during the flushing procedure: Flushing solutions Fernox Superfloc, Sentinel X300 (new systems) or X400 (existing systems). Refer to Frame 6.
- **8.** Refill and vent the system, add inhibitor (see Frame 6), clear all air locks and again check for water soundness.

Affix the water treatment warning label, supplied in the hardware pack, in a *prominent position* on the system, to prevent the use of incorrect water treatment additives.

- **9.** Reset the system initial pressure to the design requirement.
- 10. Balance the system. Refer to Frame 5.
- **11.** Check the condensate drain for leaks and check that it is discharging correctly.

The pump will operate briefly as a self-check once every 24 hours in the absence of any system demand.

40 HANDING OVER

After completing the installation and commissioning of the system the installer should hand over to the householder by the following actions:

- 1. Hand the User Instructions to the householder and explain his/her responsibilities under the relevant national regulations.
- Explain and demonstrate the lighting and shutting down procedures.
- The operation of the boiler and the use and adjustment of all system controls should be fully explained to the householder, to ensure the greatest possible fuel economy consistent with the household requirements of heating.

Advise the User of the precautions necessary to prevent damage to the system and to the building in the event of the system remaining inoperative during frosty conditions.

- Explain the function and the use of the boiler heating controls.
- 5. Explain the function of the boiler fault mode.

Emphasise that if a fault is indicated, the boiler should be turned off and a CORGI registered installer consulted. In IE contact a Competent Person.

- **6.** Explain and demonstrate the function of time and temperature controls, radiator valves etc., for the economic use of the system.
- If any programmer is fitted then draw attention to the Programmer Users Instructions and hand them to the householder.

8. Loss of system water pressure

Explain that the dial underneath the boiler indicates the central heating system pressure and that if the normal COLD pressure of the system is seen to decrease over a period of time then a water leak is indicated. Explain the re-pressurising procedure and if unable to re-pressurise or if the pressure continues to drop a CORGI registered installer should be consulted. In IE consult a Competent Person.

WARNING.

Do not fire the boiler if the pressure has reduced to zero from the original setting.

 After installation and commissioning please complete the benchmark Commissioning Checklist before handover to the customer.
 For IE, its is necessary to complete a "Declaration of Conformity" to indicate compliance to I.S. 813:2002.

10. IMPORTANT

Stress the importance of regular servicing by a CORGI registered installer and that a comprehensive service should be carried out AT LEAST ONCE A YEAR. In IE servicing work must be carried out by a Competent Person.

11. As the installer you may wish to undertake the service contract yourself or alternatively offer to the customer the benefits of the Ideal Care Scheme, details of which are outlined in the householder pack supplied with this boiler.

41 SERVICING SCHEDULE

To ensure the continued safe and efficient operation of the appliance it is recommended that it is checked at regular intervals and serviced as necessary. The frequency of servicing will depend upon the installation condition and usage but should be carried out at least annually.

It is the law that any service work must be carried out by a CORGI registered installer. In IE service work must be carried out by a competent person.

- Light the boiler and carry out a pre-service check, noting any operational faults.
- 2. Check the gas consumption.
- 3. Connect a suitable gas analyser to the sampling point on the top of the boiler (refer to Frame 43) or into the flue terminal if access is possible (optional test). For correct boiler operation the CO/CO₂ content of the flue gas should not be greater than 0.004 ratio. If this is the case, and the gas input is at least 90% of the nominal, then no further action need be taken. If not, proceed to Step 4 but see note above.
- 4. Clean the main burner.
- 5. Clean the heat exchanger and 'S' trap.
- Check the condition of the combustion chamber insulation. Any cracked/damaged pieces should be replaced.
- 7. Check the main injector for blockage or damage.

- 8. Wherever possible remove and clean the condensate 'S' trap (refer to Frame 47) and check the drain for blockage.
- **9.** Check that the flue terminal is unobstructed and that the flue system is sealed correctly.

The servicing procedures are covered more fully in Frames 42 to 49 and MUST be carried out in sequence.

Note. In order to carry out either servicing or replacement of components the boiler front panel and sealing panel must be removed. Refer to Frames 42 and 43.

WARNING. Always turn OFF the gas supply at the gas service cock, and switch OFF and disconnect the electricity supply to the appliance before servicing.

- 16. Remove the flue casting.

- 17. Remove the automatic air vent. Refer to Frame 67.
- Remove the edge clip securing the dry fire thermistor wiring.
- **19.** Remove the blind grommet to gain access to the return pipe securing bracket.
- 20. Remove the M5 screw and remove the return pipe securing bracket by sliding forwards.
- **21.** Remove the overheat thermostat and the control thermistor. Refer to Frame 55.
- 22. Remove the securing pin to release the flow pipe.
- 23. Remove the condensate 'S' trap. Refer to Frame 47.
- **24.** Remove the 2 M5 screws securing the interpanel to the back panel.
- **25.** Slide the heat exchanger and interpanel assembly upward to disengage and remove from the casing, complete with the return pipe.
- **26.** Remove the 2 M6 countersunk screws, remove the interpanel and transfer to the new heat exchanger.
- 27. Remove the M5 screw and remove the flow pipe securing bracket.
- **28.** Remove the flow pipe and transfer to the new heat exchanger.
- **29.** Reassemble in reverse order, replacing gaskets or seals if any sign of damage or deterioration is evident.

Note

The heat exchanger is supplied with new combustion chamber insulation boards. These should be fitted (refer to Frame 61) before the burner and fan / venturi assembly and before the ignition and flame detection electrodes are replaced.

- 30. Refill the boiler. Refer to Frame 30.
- **31.** Check operation of the boiler. Refer to Frame 50.




85 BURNER ASSEMBLY 11. Burner assembly with screws and gasket. Ed 1598

Introduction

The **icos system** is a wall mounted, room sealed, condensing boiler, featuring full sequence automatic spark ignition and fan assisted combustion.

Due to the high efficiency of the boiler, condensate is produced from the flue gases and this is drained to a suitable disposal point through the plastic waste pipe at the lower rear of the boiler. A condensate 'plume' will also be visible at the flue terminal.

Safety

Current Gas Safety (Installation & Use) Regulations or rules in force.

In your own interest, and that of safety, it is the law that this boiler must be installed by a CORGI registered installer. In IE the installation must be carried out by a competent person and installed in accordance with the current edition of I.S. 813 "domestic Gas Installations", the current Building Regulations and reference should be made to the current ETCI rules for electrical installation.

It is essential that the instructions in this booklet are strictly followed, for safe and economical operation of the boiler.

Electricity Supply

This appliance must be earthed.

Supply: 230 V \sim 50 Hz. The fusing should be 3A.

Connection must be made in a way that allows complete isolation of the electrical supply such as a double-pole switch, having a 3mm (1/8") contact separation in both poles, serving only the boiler and system controls. Alternatively, a 3-pin UNSWITCHED socket may be used. The means of isolation must be accessible to the user after installation.

Important Notes

- This appliance must not be operated without the casing correctly fitted and forming an adequate seal.
- If the boiler is installed in a compartment then the compartment MUST NOT be used for storage purposes.
- If it is known or suspected that a fault exists on the boiler then it MUST NOT BE USED until the fault has been corrected by a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person.
- Under NO circumstances should any of the sealed components on this appliance be used incorrectly or tampered with.

In cases of repeated or continuous shutdown a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person should be called to investigate and rectify the condition causing this and carry out an operational test . Only the manufacturers original parts should be used for replacement.

Minimum Clearances

Clearances of **165mm (6 1/2")** above, **100mm (4")** below, **5mm (1/4")** at the sides and **450mm (17 3/4")** at the front of the boiler casing must be allowed for servicing.

The minimum front and bottom clearance allowed when built into a cupboard is 5mm.

To light the boiler. Refer to Frame 1

If a programmer is fitted refer to separate instructions for the programmer before continuing.

- CHECK THAT THE ELECTRICITY SUPPLY TO THE BOILER IS OFF.
- 2. Set the mains ON/OFF switch (A) to OFF and the thermostat knob (F) to maximum.
- **3.** Switch ON the electricity supply to the boiler and check that all external controls, e.g. programmer, room thermostat, etc., are ON.
- 4. Set the mains ON/OFF switch to ON.

The boiler will commence the ignition sequence, supplying heat to the central heating, if required.

Note. In normal operation the control unit display (C) will show the codes:

- Standby no demand for heat.
- CH being supplied.

During ignition, the LED (E) will flash.

During normal running the LED (E) will remain illuminated.

Note.

If the boiler fails to light after 3 attempts the fault code L F will be displayed.

Press the reset button (D) for 2 seconds then release. The boiler will repeat the ignition sequence. If the boiler still fails to light consult a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person.

Note.

The pump will operate briefly as a self-check, once every 24 hours regardless of system demand.

Control of water temperature

The boiler controls the central heating radiator temperature to a maximum of 82°C, adjustable via the thermostat knob (F).

Approx. flow temperatures for the boiler thermostat settings are:

All CORGI registered installers carry a CORGI ID card, and have a registration number. Both should be recorded in the **Benchmark** Commissioning Checklist. You can check your installer by calling CORGI direct on 01256 372300.

Caradon Ideal Limited is a member of the Benchmark initiative and fully supports the aims of the programme. Benchmark has been introduced to improve the standards of installation and commissioning of central heating systems in the UK and to encourage the regular servicing of all central heating systems to ensure safety and efficiency.



THE BENCHMARK SERVICE INTERVAL RECORD MUST BE COMPLETED AFTER EACH SERVICE

To shut down the boiler

1. For short periods

Set the mains ON/OFF switch (A) to OFF

2. For longer periods

Set the mains ON/OFF switch (A) to OFF, and switch the electricity supply to OFF.

For longer periods the entire system should be drained.

To relight the boiler

Repeat the procedure detailed in 'To light the boiler'.

Frost protection

If no frost protection is provided and frost is likely during a short absence from home, leave the heating controls (if fitted) at a reduced temperature setting. For longer periods, the entire system should be drained.

If the system includes a frost thermostat then, during cold weather, the boiler should be turned OFF at the time switch (if fitted) ONLY. The mains supply should be left switched ON, with the boiler thermostat left in the normal running position.

Boiler overheat thermostat

This thermostat will shut down the boiler in the event of overheating. Should this occur a fault code LR will be displayed. Press the reset button (D) and the boiler will re-light.

If the fault re-occurs, turn off the boiler and consult a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person.

Flame failure

Should this occur a fault code *L-F* will be displayed. Press the reset button and the boiler will relight. If the fault recurs, turn off the boiler and consult a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person.

Loss of system water pressure

The gauge (H) indicates the central heating system pressure. If the pressure is seen to fall below the original installation pressure of 1-2 bar over a period of time then a water leak may be indicated. In this event conduct the re-pressurising procedure (see Trouble shooting problem 4). If unable to do so or if the pressure continues to drop a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person should be consulted.

DO NOT FIRE THE BOILER IF THE PRESSURE HAS REDUCED TO ZERO FROM THE ORIGINAL SETTING.

Condensate Drain

The condensate drain (G) must not be modified or blocked.

Blockage of the condensate drain, caused by debris or freezing, can cause automatic shutdown of the boiler.

If freezing is suspected and the pipe run is accessible an attempt may be made to free the obstruction by pouring hot water over the exposed pipe and clearing any blockage from the end of the pipe. If this fails to remedy the problem the assistance of a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person should be sought.

Escape of gas

Should a gas leak or fault be suspected contact your local gas supplier without delay.

Do NOT search for gas leaks with a naked flame.

Cleaning


For normal cleaning simply dust with a dry cloth.

To remove stubborn marks and stains, wipe with a damp cloth and finish off with a dry cloth.

DO NOT use abrasive cleaning materials.

Maintenance

The appliance should be serviced at least once a year by a CORGI registered installer or in IE a competent person.



CAUTION. To avoid the possibility of injury during the installation, servicing or cleaning of this appliance care should be taken when handling edges of sheet steel components.
